Excitement 'disrupts' smooth-running council

It is noteworthy that this third session of Vatican Council II has been almost without humor. In previous sessions a number of good stories made the rounds, but so far only two have been concocted this time.

The first is about the periti, or experts, who help write, when they do not completely compose sney no not completely compose the speeches given by the hish-ops. One of these must have heen responsible for describing the council as the place where pertit compose speeches, poorly deliv-ered by bishops, for the benefit of other periti.

There is some truth to this. One American peritus even got a Pakistan bishop to deliver a learned speech for him.

The other is nothing but a story. It was inspired by the return of the head of St. Andrew to the Greeks. The Germans are supposed to have said on this occasion: "If the Greeks can have the head of St. Andrew, we want the head of Ottaviani." And the cardinal head of the Holy Office, upon hearing this wry bit of humon, is supposed to have said: "Let them have it they need some brains up in Germanay."

ANOTHER THING that was missing in this session was the suspense engendered by the several crises of the previous sessions. The council was moving along too smoothly. But the weekend before Columbius Day brought plenty of excitement.

Liturgy 'instruction' issued by the Vatican

VATICAN CITY—The striking new changes in the Mass made by the instruction of the Vatican Liturgy Commission aim at stressing the community nature of Christian worship and taking full advantage of the liturgy's educational or formative possi-bilities,

The new changes, which are mandatory on March 7, 1965, the first Sunday of Lent, but could be implemented earlier in some countries, must be regarded as a preliminary step in the overall liturgical reform decreed last December by the Second Vatican Council.

In the Constitution on the Lit-urgy the council gave broad man-dates for reforms to be worked out in detail by a commission drawn from all over the world. Early this year, Pope Paul VI est up the commission with the major task of revising the offi-cial missal, ritual, breviary and so forth. UNLIKE THE changes of lit-urgical texts into various lan-guages, which are questions en-trusted by the council to the bish-ops of each country, the new in-struction is obligatory throughout the Latin rites of the Church by the expressed direction of Pope Paul.

ROME — The Bishops of the United States at a meeting here formally approved November 29, the first Sunday of Advent, as the official date for the introduction of English in the Mass.

This date, the first day of the new Church year, had been wide-ty anticipated as the day that the new English use would go into effect in the Mass throughout the United States. In some American dioceses, however, English was introduced in the Mass last sum-mer

mer.

Vatican II comes to grips with modern world issues

VATICAN CITY - In an attempt to understand the modern world and to interpret the Church message to that world, the council Fathers began discussion of of one of the most talked-a b o u t and long-awaited emas on its agenda.

Elight cardinals took the floor (Oct. 20) and all but one expressed general satisfaction with the text of schema 13 on the Church in the modern world. They asked the council to accept it as a basis for discussion.

Cardinal Francis Spellman of
New York halled it as "representing the basic hopes of the Second
Vatican Council" and asked that
in recommending changes, council Fathers take care not to
weaken but rather to strengthen
the text and improve its clarity.

Both Cardinal Julius Doepfner of Munich, Germany, and Carof Munich, Germany, and Car-dinal Giocomo Lercaro of Bo-logna, Italy, cautioned against speed in deliberations. The latter observed that "perhaps there is not even time enough left in this session — especially if there is going to be a fourth session next year."

SAYING HE WAS unhappy with the impression given by the text that the Church "fears contagion from associating with the world," Cardinal Albert Meyer of Chicago carrinal Ameri steyer of clieges of the called for a deeper understanding of the role of the world in the plan of salvation. He cited Scripture and tradition to support his contention that the world itself, and not only the soul of man, is the proper object of Redemption.

By a vote of 1,821 to 29, the council approved the whole of chapter seven of the schema on the nature of the Church. Various parts of the chapter had been approved separately on the previous day. The chapter concerns the four last things-death, judgment, heaven and hell — and af-firms the final vocation of every-one to paradise. There were 233 votes of qualified approval.

After three speakers completed debate on the proposition on the Eastern churches, the council decided by a vote of 1,911 to take a final vote on it the following day (Oct. 21) rather than to send it back to commission for revision. Opposing this were 265 Fathers.

The Cardinal said it is probable that after his visit to Bombay the Pope will go to New Delhi for a courtesy call on President Sarvepall Rodhakrishana and that he might also go to Goa, where the remains of St. Francis Xavier are to be on exposition.

VATICAN CITY — Pope Paul VI has announced he will go to India for the International Eucharistic Congress being held in Bombay from November 28 to December 6.

The announcement was made at the end of his address during the canonization of 22 African martyrs of Uganda in St. Peter's basilica (Oct. 18).

The Pope revealed no details The Pope revealed no details of his trip except to say that it would be "very brief and simple." It is expected that the Pope will go to Bombay for the closing ceremonies in the congress on December 6.

After his tribute to the Uganda martyrs, Pope Paul announced that he intended to go to India "to bring to them our sincere message of Christian rath...."

Prior to going to New York at the age of 17 to seek a career in show business, Miss Henderson had practically no formal voice training.

"Even as a little girl, I always liked to sing," she said, "and I guess the good Lord blessed me with a better than average voice."

Shortly after her arrival on Broadway, she was signed for "Wish You Were Here." At the same time she augmented her natural talent by studying at the American Academy of Dramatic

THE BIBLE is under the gen-eral editorship of William Fox-well Albright, professor emeritus of Semitic languages and litera-ture at Johns Hopkins University, and David Noel Freedman, pro-fessor of Hebrew and Old Testa-ment at Pittsburgh Theological Seminary.

The editors said the Bible seeks to present "the meaning of Biblical literature through exact translation and extended exposition, and to reconstruct the ancient setting of the Biblical story.

"The chief criterion was front-line knowledge of the tremendous new world recovered by arch-eological and philological re-search during the past century, and especially during the past two or three decades."

They said the Anchor Bible of-fers improved Biblical texts and corrects misinterpretations caus-ed by linguistic inaccuracies. The modern translation, it was noted, also reflects new knowledge of Hebrew poetic style.





Deserved award

Few Americans and few men of good will anywhere in the world will quarrel with the choice of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., for the 1964 Nobel Peace Prize.

This particular award, in a century of frightful strife, has become one of the most statused that men can give to other men. There have been years, in fact, in which the Norwegian Parliament has not seen fit to give it to anybody.

Why Dr. King? He is not a diplomat. He is not a world statesman. He is not involved in any way with such engagements as the United Nations.

Why Dr. King?

Dr. King, said the Nobel Institute at Oslo, "has consist-ly asserted the principle of non-violence."

When one thinks back upon the remarkable career of the still-young Negro civil rights leader, the consistency shines. Less than a decade ago he mustered a bus boycott in Montgomery, Ala, which became the true starting point of the civil rights movement.

Through the years he has tirelessly preached and prac-ticed discipline, wise restraint, and a courageous course of non-violence which have been the backbone of civil rights in America and an inspiration to the world.

He is the youngest person, at 35, ever to receive the coveted award. Although he is far from being a rich man, he has pledged the monetary prize—all \$51,000 of it—to the civil rights movement.

Let some of his critics, white and Negro, follow his example and ours will be a better nation, a better world.

QUESTION BOX

Can we baptize by immersion?

By MSGR. J. D. CONWAY

Q. Recently, while on a European four I had the pleasure of visiting the ancient Cathedral in Milan, Italy. To my astenishment, I heard the Italian guide, who excerted my party, say that in Milan they baptize by immersion and not by pouring the water, as

I have always believed, and I am sure that I was taught, that for Baptism to be valid, the water must be poured. Now, if the Church is universal, how can a Sacrament so important as Baptism be admin-istered in more than one way.

A. In the Archdiocese of Milan the Ambrosian Rite is used (just how extensively I do not know). The traditional method of Baptism in this rite is by immersion.

The law of the Church (Canon 788), notes that Baptism may be validly conferred by the pouring of water, by immersion, or by sprinkling, but permits the use of only the first or second method (or of these two methods combined). In other words, sprinkling is not permitted by present law of the Church, though it was sometimes used in past centuries in some places.

In earliest centuries the most common method In earliest centuries the most common method Baptism was by immersion; though the pouring of water seems to have been used in some cases, even from the beginning. In later times a custom developed of having the candidate for baptism enter the font or pool, in which the water might come to his knees or his watst, and then water would be poured on his head.

In the Latin or Roman Rite in recent centuries ir liturgical books permit only the pouring of ater, Eastern Catholic Rites still baptize by im-

The Church is one in doctrine, one in sanctifying union with Jesus, one in loyalty to the Vicar of Christ on earth, one in the collegiate unity of all its bishops, on earth, one in the collegiate unity of all its bishops, successors of the Apostles. The Church is one in sharing the same Sacrifice, in joining in the one Holy Communion of mutual love with Christ and with each other, and in receiving the same Sacraments. But in the course of 20 centuries it has developed a variety of rites and eremonies.

The Bishops of the Church, joined in Council in St. Peter's, have the Mass (or Sacred Liturgy) quite often in one of the Eastern Rites—which seem quite foreign to you and me.

Q. A friend just told me that the Catholic Church now allows people to be cremated and that the final blessing of the Church is also given. She said this was done because in many of the old countries all the space in cemeteries was used up.

My friend obtained all this information from a question and answer column in our local daily paper. I thought I would ask you as I certainly would never take the word of the (name of paper suppressed) and anything to do with any religion.

A. Your paper happens to be right about the fact, but I am a bit doubtful about the reason. After all they do have some rather macabre methods of making new room in old cemeteries.

The main reasons are twofold: cremation is no longer a gesture of disdain for belief in the resurrection of the body; and the Church is confronted in some areas of the world with ancient national customs of cremation. If she is to be accepted and make progress in such countries she must not flight these cherished customs.

The Church has always taught that there is nothinherently wrong with cremation, and she has permitted it in some areas of the world, and even in Catholic countries in time of plagues. The Church still favors burial; but finds that there is no longer need for her penalties against those who prefer cremation—unless in a particular case the preferremee is clearly based on implous motives. So now you may have a funeral before they burn you to ashes, but I don't know what we will do about the ceremonies for the blessing of the grave.

Q. Who coined the expression and when was it originated: "O death, where is thy victory? O death, where is thy sting?" I found it in my Old Testament in quotation marks.

A. I do not find these precise words in the Old Testament. However, St. Paul, in I Corinthians 15, 5, does have them in quoting from Osee, 13, 14, even though the words are not precisely the same. Osee wrote: "O death, where are thy plaguest O Sheol, where is thy sting!" In Osee you may have found these words in quotation marks because they are threats made by God to Israel, promising destruction.

St. Paul's quotation applies these words to the triumph of the Resurrection: "But when this mortal body pats on immortality, then shall come to pass the word that is written, 'Death is swallowed up in victory,' O death, where is thy victory? How? By offering their services to families of disadvantaged youngsters in after-school tutoring, Msgr. Gallagher points out.

This risk of inciting "enmity" is a toughy, as any social-service worker knows. But it thereby is lifted above the routine chore into a challenging exercise of compassion, understanding and diplomacy — qualities essential in the success of the Mississippl project, and qualities demanding that sense of sharing rather than "lecturing" which is Chris-tian action at its best.

As Msgr. Gallagher points out, privileged students can help in many ways—from substituting for absent parental supervision and encouragement to tutoring pre-schoolers and tiny schoolers so they will be better equipped for class-room disciplines.

Its function is not to stir up further the already widespread fanaltical anti-Communism. On the contrary, its members are all known for their dedication to dialogre, to lowering of tension, and to co-existence.

By Church law, such a person is obliged to con-fess his sin in the sacrament of Penance before he may approach the table of the Lord.

O. How often must a Catholic receive Holy Communion? Every Catholic who has attained the use of reason must receive Holy Communion once a year during the Easter season, for Jesus is the Paschal Lamb of His Church.

General MacArthur's memoirs a 'must'

Reminiscences," by Douglas MacArthur, McGraw Hill, New York, 426 pp. \$6.95.

This is an unusual book, as it had to be. Being the autobio-graphy of Gen. Douglas Mac-Arthur, it had to provoke con-troversy.

And yet, no one denies it is a book that ought to be on the shelf of anyone interested in American history.

BUT ON THE other hand, Douglas MacArthur actually accomplished all the things of complished all the things of complished all the things of things of the thi

and was the one dominant figure in the Korean War.

And these were only some of the things he did. He was a prominent figure in sports, which he encouraged, and a highly placed hasinessman after his retirement. Those who didn't know MacArthur while he was alive will be because of the grand style in which it is written and the many things it elains. Those who knew MacArthur will know that the style was his, and that he went through all that he relates, Some of these latter will not like the book because of the General in the flesh. He was not a half fellow well met; he was not easy to warm up to.

GEN. MacARTHUR always had

GEN. MacARTHUR always had a lot of "dash." This reviewer first met him when the General was Chief of Staff. Despite his academic record at West Point,

he had about him general officers who were held to be his super-iors in brilliance. But, noverthe-less, MacArthur dominated the scene. And, seemingly, it was eyer thus.

No doubt about it, Gen. Mac-Arthur was a great man. Try to think of a person in American history who did so many big and varied things over so long a span of time. He was a hero of not one, but three, wars. He was adviser of three governments, He literally made over Japan.

It will be too bad if the style and tone of the book turn many people away from it. For here are set down, from one man's point of view to be sure, some of the most dramatic and world-shaping events of the last four decades, and even more.


