

THE PUMPKIN WAS PURLOINED

New stories about Pope John

ROME—Just before Pope Paul VI announced some months ago that he had initiated the beatification process for his two predecessors, new material about Pope John was published in Italy.

The illustrated weekly "Oggi" began a series of interviews with persons who knew John well and who had preserved some of his letters to them. About the same time Davide Cugini, a lawyer who shared with Angelo Roncalli an interest in Bergamese history, published a brief and well-authenticated narrative of the future Pope's early years which has an appendix of his previously unpublished letters to Bergamese friends.

The new material is mainly marginal, but it all conveys something of John.

Davide Cugini gives a convincing account of John's childhood in a patriarchal, rural family where life revolved around the family and the Church, where "the tolling of the Franciscans' bell at 11 was the signal to begin preparing lunch."

set out to hear a Franciscan's sermon, but before he could do so he was on the way.

When Angelo returned to Sotto il Monte the parish priest asked him if he had heard the sermon. As the boy's affirative answer was a little unsteady the priest asked if the Franciscan had worn a surplice. The answer "yes" betrayed the future Pope because Franciscans do not wear surplices while preaching.

When recounting the incident, Angelo Roncalli would growl in Bergamese dialect: "That surplice of the friar tricked me."

However, it was fruit, not priars, which caused Angelo's failings from the time when he returned home with an outside pumpkin. The patriarch of the family Zaverio asked Angelo who had given it to them. "No one," he answered. "I took it," Zaverio made him return it to the friar, who, whose field Angelo had found it.

Then there was the basket of dried figs which his mother hid under her bed. Angelo found them, tried to eat one, and then to compare its taste with the first, then a third and so on. Finally, he tried to touch it, but his mother's suspicions were aroused as soon as she returned home.

When she asked Angelo if he had eaten any figs, he gave her a slip of paper on which he had written "who, when, but within two hours, his stomach was swollen, and he was writhing in pain. As a result, he took a lifelong aversion for figs.

But apples inflicted the most damage of all. Angelo Roncalli, like Adam, might have considered them the root of all evil, but he was accused at college of breaking regulations by bringing in some apples from outside. A committee of inquiry was appointed. Young Roncalli claimed that some boarders had asked him to procure the apples, but none of the mould aimed this as if he did not reveal their names.

Because of this incident and because the rough country boy had poor results, particularly in Latin, the rector wrote to Angelo Roncalli's parish priest suggesting that he should no longer continue at the college. He consigned the letter to young Roncalli who destroyed it, "because it contained a false version of the facts."

Even when he was patriarch of Venice, some 60 years later, the hurt had not healed. He was solemnly complaining against the unjust accusation and state, "I was erroneously punished for a fault I did not commit."

THE SAME "Oggi" article cites an anecdote by Marcel Achard, the famous French playwright, about Pope John in relation to Pius XII, "said that he knew Pius XII," said

heard; "he was timid, reflective, introverted. Pope John, on the contrary, had such exuberant vitality that he won you from the first moment. While Roncalli was apostolic nuncio in Paris, someone told Pius XII that he (Monsignor Roncalli) walked around town too much. When the Monsignor went to Rome, Pius XII repeated this comment, but as usual Roncalli had a ready answer: "It is true, Your Holiness, but I do it only to increase your glory. In fact, everywhere I go everyone asks after you, everyone extolls your praises."

Pope John was diplomatic because of his quick wit and sensibility rather than from any desire for a career. This is clear from one of the previously unpublished letters which appears in Davide Cugini's booklet.

Archbishop Roncalli wrote it from Sofia, on April 26, 1938, to Don Giovanni Birlolini in Solto Sottana. "Ghodonella di pace. I did not choose my motto by chance. As Scipio was called the African, so I am prepared to become the Bulgare. This is our true glory in the Church of the Lord: to search for the reign of Jesus where Providence wants us and not where desire for comfort or vanity or glory carries us even though these are cloaked by apparently meritorious motives such as a great or opportunity for the service of the Church. The Lord and the Church use us, but have no need of us."

Another letter from Sofia, written on May 18, 1938 and collected by Cugini, recalls the rock rhythms of the Bergamo countryside to which John remained faithful: "Please excuse my delay in replying. One of the things which he did not rush, but which arrived at the right time was the Vatican Council which, according to General Coconi in the "Oggi" series, began to germinate on May 15, 1929.

General Coconi, the military attaché at the Italian embassy in Sofia, was with Roncalli that day among the crowd which watched the Greek Orthodox prelates' procession as they rendered homage to the king on the national feast day. Archbishop Roncalli was very moved at the sight of the Greek Orthodox bishops and said to Coconi: "Oh how happy I would be if the Churches which are separated could one day come together again."

Another letter from Sofia, written on May 18, 1938 and collected by Cugini, recalls the rock rhythms of the Bergamo countryside to which John remained faithful: "Please excuse my delay in replying. I am like a bird which sings in a thorny wood. Here, as in Sofia, I have to begin from zero. These people also are new to modern life, and they are making great efforts to elevate themselves. Naturally they use their own wings. One has to respect their efforts and finish with the habit of considering certain people as the condemned of whom St. Augustine spoke. All people can develop themselves and the Church encourages them all even when, because of certain hasty actions, it suffers."

AS HE WAS so understanding towards young nations, it was to be expected that he would understand the young. Cugini presents a letter Archbishop Roncalli wrote from Istanbul to Don Giovanni Birlolini which reflects his attitude: "I do not trumble as do old people who don't think so," answered the patriarch playing on the similarity between "conti" and "contadini" "because you are the son of counts (conti) while I am the son of peasants (contadini)."

Cugini, in his booklet, tells of a visit by Venice's Marxist administrators to the patriarch in which they conveyed to him an unpleasant decision regarding St. Mark's. As soon as they left, his secretary Monsignor Capovilla exploded: "But does such an attitude seem just to you, your eminence?" "Dear Don Capovilla," replied Cardinal Roncalli as calm as the city's lagoon, "what do you expect from these lads?"

He described it in a letter dated March 10, 1938, addressed to Professor Pietro Donzelli and now published for the first time in Cugini's study: "In

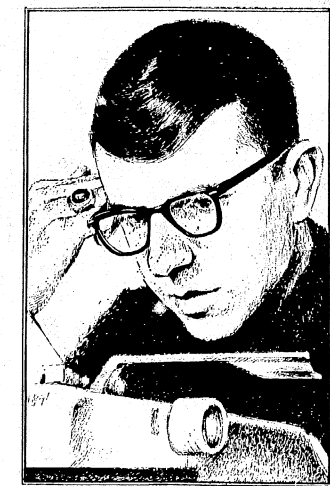

Passionists slate groundbreaking

LOUISVILLE, Ky.—Groundbreaking ceremonies are slated Sunday, June 7, for a new house of studies to accommodate the Passionist seminarians of the Passionist Fathers' Holy Cross Province. The \$1 million project, to include classrooms, library, two residence halls, chapel, dining hall, kitchen and garage-workshop, will be constructed at adjoining Sacred Heart Monastery and St. Agnes Church on Newburg Road. When completed in September, 1967, the facilities will accommodate up to 150 seminarians, now studying in St. Louis and Louisville monasteries. The Louisville students are presently taking liberal arts courses at Bellarmine College, which is adjacent to the Passionist Fathers' property.

Catholics in Britain fight charities tax

LONDON—Catholics have linked forces with charities, welfare and educational groups in Britain in a battle against a new government payroll tax. A mass rallies, propaganda drives, direct approaches to the government were organized to seek exemption from taxation aimed at forcing more workers into the vital save-the-economy exporting industries.

The tax, if legalized through Parliament in its present shape, would impose a weekly duty of \$4 for each man and \$2 for each woman employed in non-productive work. It would send the Catholic payroll rocketing by millions more dollars a year. It could mean the end of some smaller social and welfare groups and would certainly curb Catholic activities already restricted by an overloaded school bill.

The Catholic Women's League estimates that the tax would cost them about \$14,000. The Catholic Truth Society has \$5,600, even the small hard-working Catholic Prisoners' Society would have to produce about \$900 a year. Disaster could hit the Catholic Housing Aid Society, the Catholic Social Guild.

The new tax would lay heavy on St. Joseph's Hospital for the Dying, one of London's most modern charities built by the Irish Sisters of Charity, and St. David's Home here for disabled servicemen also under the care of the Sisters of Charity, and on the big heavily-staffed independent Catholic hospitals such as London's St. John and St. Elizabeth.

(Continued from page 1) — in a spirit of prayerful meditation. "In the framework of the present liturgy, as a general rule, the Ordinary parts of the Mass will be recognized as the responsibility of the entire worshipping community. Here the choir is joined to the remainder of the congregation, leading and assisting them in a variety of ways, supporting and enhancing the worship. "The distinctive musical contribution of the choir should be made primarily in the Proper parts of the Mass, but not to the total exclusion of the assembly. Thus, both the unity of God's people and the harmonious diversity of roles in the music of the liturgy become obvious. The choir then exercises its true liturgical function. "Constitution on the Liturgy, art. 29, while the whole body of the faithful (contributes) that active participation which is rightly theirs" (art. 14). "In those instances when it is not possible for a choir to fulfill these functions in the liturgical celebration, the use of a cantor is to be highly recommended. Although he cannot enhance the service of worship in the same way as a choir, a trained and competent cantor can perform an important ministry by leading the congregation in common sacred song and in responsorial singing."

LONDON—Two Anglican bishops and an Orthodox archbishop attended a special Bible service in London's Westminster cathedral to launch the Catholic edition of the Revised Standard version of the Bible here.

Cardinal John Heenan of Westminster led the service in the presence of the Apostolic Delegate to Britain, Archbishop Ireno Cardinaline, and a group of notable biblical experts who had helped prepare the Catholic edition.

Cardinal Heenan in a brief address expressed pleasure that "at last we have a reasonably common text to share with our fellow Christians."

Graduate theology school to close

NOTRE DAME, Ind.—St. Mary's College here will close its graduate school of sacred theology at the end of the summer.

The school, founded in 1944 by the late Sister St. Madeleva, St. Mary's president for 27 years, has "staunchly and well served its purpose," said Sister Mary Grace, president of the college.

It was founded to provide theological training for women, she said, until such training could be made available at universities, "where the deeper study of theology properly belongs."

Since Notre Dame University will open a graduate department of theology in September, she said, St. Mary's thought it "less than wise" to continue its school.
